


Austin E. Knowlton

Mr. Austin E. Knowlton, also known as "Dutch", was the owner and Chairman of the Knowlton Construction Company, an organization started in Bellefontaine, Ohio, in 1937. His company was responsible for more than 600 major and significant construction projects throughout Ohio and the Midwest, including school buildings, hospitals, libraries and post offices.

Knowlton graduated from Bellefontaine High School in Logan County, Ohio, in 1927 and from the Ohio State University in 1931, where he received a bachelor of science degree in architectural engineering. He became an avid sportsman with a particular interest in saddlebred horses. Later, he served as trustee of the Little Brown Jug Society for harness racing in Delaware, Ohio. Knowlton was a founding partner of the Cincinnati Bengals football team, for which he served as chairman, and he held a major ownership interest for many years in the Cincinnati Reds baseball team. Knowlton was a leading philanthropist with the Ohio State School of Architecture, which was named in his honor.



Memorial Scholarship

The Knowlton Scholarship at Kalamazoo College shall be awarded to one first-year student in the amount of at least \$5,000 per year, renewable for each of the next three years, for a total of four years. The Knowlton Scholarship shall support a resident of Ohio with a preference to a first-year applicant interested in majoring in a STEM field–science, technology, engineering, or mathematics.

RESIDENTIAL LIFE

First-year students and sophomores are required to live in Kalamazoo College's living system, which includes six residence halls and eight Living Learning Houses. Living Learning Houses have themes that include: Art and Community House, Fostering Community House, French House, Health and Nutrition House, Homestead, Mental and Emotional Wellness House, Music House, Queer House, and Sustainability House. Residence halls feature laundry facilities and Internet connection. Each hall is staffed with a team of resident assistants supervised by two full-time area coordinators.
